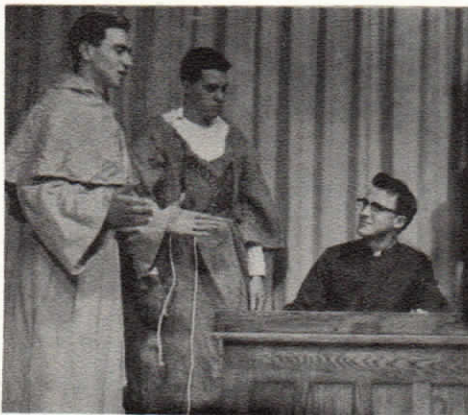

### 'The Billion Dollar Saint' Features Cast of 23

"The Billion Dollar Saint" by Natalie White, this year's Christmas play presented by the students of St. Joseph's Seminary, boasts one of the largest casts ever to appear on the seminary stage. The cast and production crew total 33 men from four classes. The second college is represented in its entirety. There will be a formal dress rehearsal for the entire student body, December 20. Priests, Sisters, and parents of the students will view the play at three successive performances, December 21, 22, and 23.

A saint appearing anywhere at any time would naturally cause a stir.

But when Saint Francis of Assisi appears at a Jesuit University (name, of course, St. Ignatius University) on October 4, the feast of St. Francis, only a few miles from a Franciscan monastery, absolute bedlam results. An almost unending line of vice-presidents is called in to cope with the problem, but to no avail. Even attempts to "push off" the saint on the nearby Franciscans fails.

Further complications arise when Saint Francis begins preaching to the students and wins them to his cause. When the S.I.U. football team in barefeet and burlap defeats an astounded Iona City eleven, 66-0, the N.C.A.A. is implored, and the Iona City team is awarded the win. This throws the already extremely nervous coach into a tantrum and the Jesuit Fathers into a host of apologies.

A secretary of the Secretary of State arrives from Washington and tries to settle things, but he fails. The president of the S.I.U. Alumni Association, thinking that the university is in need of money, raises a billion dollars (yes, that's \$1,000,000,000) for the school.

Finally, whether immensely impressed by the simplicity of Saint Francis or overwhelmed by the fortunes and misfortunes of the whole situation, the football team of S.I.U. and the Jesuit Fathers as well, bare their feet and follow in the footsteps of the holy intruder.

The entire play is a riotous comedy and extremely enjoyable. Directed by Fr. Hackett, the cast features as main characters Al Theis, Jim Rudnik, Joe Schmiedicke and Tom Thompson. Ron Fries is assistant director and Dick Witucki is in charge of production and staging.

## Sermon on Sovereign Pontiff Begins Month in His Honor



"Seminarians are to give a year's special honor to the Holy Father. To keep this at a high pitch all seminaries have been assigned a special month. The seminaries in the United States have been assigned the month of November." These were the introductory words of Msgr. Shaw's sermon on the Feast of all Saints.

Monsignor pointed out the fact that none of us was old enough to remember any other pope than Pius XII. Thus, he concluded that we have all the more reason for special honor to the present Holy Father.

During the course of his sermon Msgr. Shaw pointed out the vigor with which the now-reigning Sovereign Pontiff carries out his duties of administration to the Catholic Church, although he is eighty years old. Monsignor explained how the Holy Father himself suffers whenever people throughout the world suffer, for he is the true spiritual father of all. "But he has a particular like for seminarians," said Msgr. Shaw, "because through you, as future priests, he can reach the down-trodden of the world." He went on to explain the

necessity of a good preparation for this mission of mercy. He exhorted us to keep abreast of the times and to determine what the troubles of the people are and what they seek in sermons. He warned us against ambition, exhorting us to take, not ourselves, but Christ to the people. He warned us not to be so engulfed in our work as to forget our own salvation. "Follow Christ's example. Be busy about it every moment of your seminary life. Live as if Christ were at your side. Direct all actions to Christ."

Thus, Msgr. Shaw began a special month of honor to the Pope in an extremely eloquent manner.

## Fr. Thome Forms 45 Voice Glee Club

The long-awaited Seminary Glee Club finally came into existence in the early part of this 1956-57 school year, with the first formal gathering on Saturday evening, September 29. This club was organized partly to replace the seminary orchestra. This went out of existence a few years ago. The glee club, under the direction of Father John Thome, includes about forty-five members. Since its formation, the group has made one formal appearance. On the day of the de-

dications of the Activities Building, members sang the Veni Creator after the bishop entered. Vivat, Ecce Quam Bonum, and Gaudeamus Igitur were sung in unison, followed by Stout-Hearted Men in four parts. A group composed of choir and glee club members sang Jubilate Deo. The Glee Club is now preparing a Christmas program, which will be presented between the acts of



the annual Christmas Drama. Father Thome will direct the four performances.

Formed in 1948 by Father J. Ciesluk and J. Bernard Haviland to foster religious vocations, the Grand Rapids Serra Club, first such organization in Michigan, has made rapid and great advances in the past eight years. 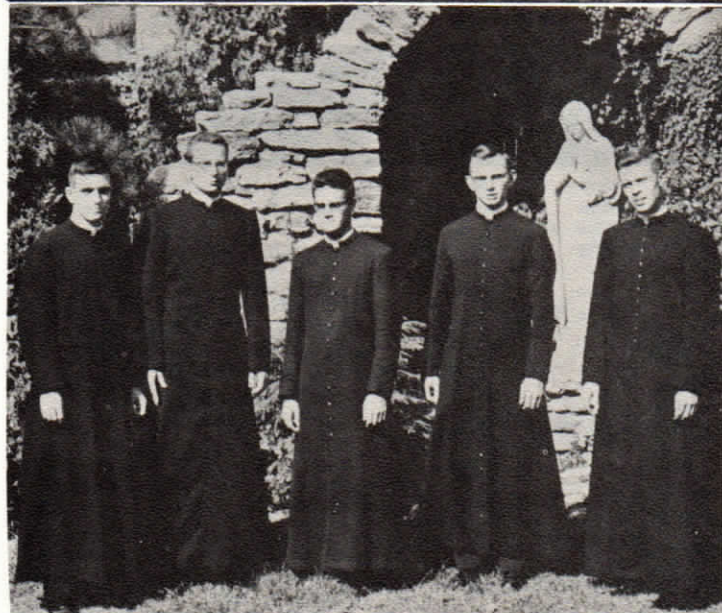

# U.S. SEMINARIES GIVE SPECIAL HONOR TO POPE

## High School Speeches Center on Holy Father's Life

The SCAS meetings in the high school department during the month of November have been entirely devoted to the life and teachings of our present Holy Father, Pope Pius XII, in expression of our sincere appreciation for and our filial devotion to him. Each speech during the meetings was concerned with a certain phase of the Pope's life or some interesting aspect pertaining to it.

At our first meeting November 4, the opening phase of the Pope's life was discussed, covering the period from his birth to his ordination. Speakers and speeches presented were: Robert Foco, on the ancestry of Pius XII; Pedro Garcia, on the childhood and early training of the Pope; and Gerald Szucs, on the Pope as a seminarian. This meeting set the foundation work for the following meetings.

The meeting of November 11 began with a rendition of Long Live the Pope sung by the SCAS body. Speeches for this section covered the period of the Pope's life from his ordination to his cardinalate. Speakers were: Peter Gwik, on the Pope's ordination and early years as a parish priest; Michael McBarnes, on the Pope's years as Papal Nuncio to Bavaria; Thomas Kelsch, on the Pope as Cardinal and Secretary of State; and Edward Hahnenberg, on the travels of the Pope in the United States. This meeting included a more serious portion of Pope Pius XII's life; namely, his work as a leading figure in the Church.

The final meeting, November 18, comprised the life of Pius XII from his election to the papacy to the present time. Speakers and speeches were: Paul Milanowski, on the period from the Pope's election to the year 1948; Michael Danner on the Pope's post-war activities; Richard Menzel, on the Pope's daily life; and David Nabs, on the Pope's life from 1948 to the present time. In final tribute to Pope Pius XII the High School choir rendered Jubilate Deo.

## College SCAS Commemorates Pontiff's 80th Birthday

Since November was designated as the month in which American seminaries were to honor the 80th birthday of the Holy Father, St. Joseph's Seminary worked out its own way of paying tribute to him. It was decided to promote tribute to Pius XII through the Students' Catholic Action Service.

The College department of SCAS formulated three aims or purposes for the month: to learn more about our Pontiff, to understand and appreciate his works, and to aid him in his work by our prayers.

The first meeting, November 4, conducted by the Democratic Committee, fulfilled the first aim for the month. The theme for the meeting, "The Life of Pius XII", was developed by speeches on the Pope's life up to 1929 by Tom Sabourin; his cardinalate, by Tom Vesbit; and his papacy, by Rolland Spencer.

Several meetings were devoted to the second aim: to understand and appreciate his works. November 11, the Angelic Committee presided over the meeting. Its theme was "Works of Pius XII". The Pope's Christmas message for 1955 was the topic of a speech by Vernon Armbrustmacher. The subject matter for two other speeches was centered around the Pope's encyclicals. "Mediator Dei" was discussed by Joe Schmiedicke. Al Ten Eyck dealt with "Menti Nostrae". The

The ensuing week, "Pacelli Week" was highlighted with daily bulletin board displays about the Pontiff. This project was undertaken by various SCAS committees together with the Press Committee.

November 18, the meeting was directed by the Newman and Academia Committees. The Newman had speeches on events during Pius' life; namely, the Holy Year by Dale LaBrie and the Marian Year, by Pat Corcoran. The Academia had a speech on Pius XII, Father of the Missions delivered by Fred Kawka. The last meeting on the Holy Father was conducted by the Latin Club. This committee, having as its theme "The Vatican and the World", had speeches on the Holy Father's foreign policy before, during, and after World War II delivered by Louis Anderson, Joe Suchoski, and Gerald Norman respectively.

The final aim of College SCAS for November, to pray

## Sport Event in New Building: Alumni Cage Game, November 17

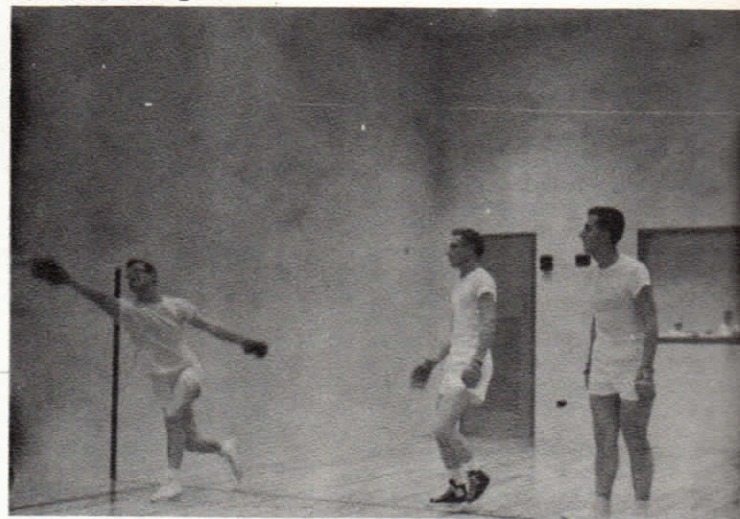
