

The seminary helps boys grow into men and accompanies boys on this journey to manhood.

The prime purpose of our way of life here at the seminary is to emerge into the life of God, this emergence coming to some individuals more easily than others, and to some, quicker than others, but to all a growth indeed, and the only growth that is truly unlimited.

The second growth and, like the first, an intangible one, is what is considered the product of education – our intellectual and psychological growth. This growth, though intangible, is by no means imperceptible and is all important before the fuller life can be obtained.

Our third and most immediately noticeable growth is that toward physical maturity. How important strong physical health is to the growth of our minds and souls too! The importance of our health will be very clear in the future when it determines to a great extent the amount of work we will be able to do for God. For most of us the ability to move and work with ease and do the things we want to do is an important factor in determining our happiness. Phys-

ical health, and consequently much of our happiness, would be impossible without growth.

The seminary helps boys grow. At times growth can be arrested or even reversed, and for this reason we have a capable faculty with counselors to attend to any spiritual and intellectual difficulties, but our more serious physical needs are referred to one of three dedicated men who receive very little recognition for their work.

For 23 years, as did Dr. Walter Jaracz for 20 years before them, these men have made our growth their business – and their business has been a great success. Many a student has stood bravely, and on some occasions, not so bravely, before these men as they ministered to his needs.

To say the least, our seminary has grown since 1909, and there are three who have been major catalysts in our development.

It is with an appreciation (that is likewise growing) for the hours of time and effort that we now look back on the progress we have made and fix our eyes on the future with its promises of even more abundant growth, that we try to give back a little of what they have given us by dedicating this first edition of the St. Joseph <u>Beckoner</u> to Dr. Joseph Moleski, M.D., Dr. Leo Moleski, M.D., and Dr. Stanley Moleski, M.D.



ACADE-MICS

Academically, the seminary maintains very high standards of quality. It provides its students with a well rounded education covering all the major fields. Its language department is equipped with microschool listening-centers for the development of language skills in French, Spanish, and Latin. The science laboratory provides ample facilities for experiments in chemistry and biology. Numerous social sciences are offered; and skills in choral, fine arts, typing, and speech are also taught. To round out the curriculum,

seminarians are acquainted with mathematics and receive four years of literature and English.

Along with this fine curriculum, there is also a well stocked library which is adapted to the special needs of the seminarians. It contains about 7,000 volumes, as well as many current periodicals. This library is at the disposal of the students at all times; students are also urged to use the Grand Rapids Public Library if there be a need.




