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# Help Fence

Another lesson in practical charity was attempted at the seminary during the month of May. the com-bined efforts of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine and the Academia Committee strove to make the Diocesan Development Fund drive a success.

The method of collection used was much the same as in parishes of the diocese. This, the committee men thought, would help acquaint the students with the actual parish method. Pledge cards were distributed. The solicitors were the table prefects. The drive in the seminary was extended over a four week period to take the "pinch" out of giving.

Since a new fence has just been erected around the seminary grounds, the slogan and motto of the seminary drive was \*Help Fence Us In!"
Displays appeared in both the administration building and in Saint Henry's Hall which depicted the layout of the seminary surrounded by a dark line. As donations filtered in, a wire fence was constructed on the line. The fence was of a silver color to resemble the actual one.

The goal which appeared at the end of the fence was \$400. A total of \$350 has already been pledged by

the students.

A great barrage of displays shows a keen interest in the DDF not only by the members of the committees themselves but also by a good percentage of the students. But the true gauge is the contributions. Thus far, these have been expectedly high. If this pace continues, all concerned can hope for a DDF success this year.

# Bigger And Better Things

A stock phrase, when considering a graduation, is that of moving on "to bigger and better things." We of the sixth class have heard this expression more than once already, and it would be surprising to no one if

we were to hear it more than once again.

If we are moving on to bigger and better things, this is not to say that we have now reached the point where a rather tedious existence has ceased and a new and better mode of life is awaiting us. It is rather that the whole seminary course, both minor and major, is a 12 year succession of these bigger and better things. From the time of our entrance into St. Joseph's on Sept. 6, 1955, our curriculum has been geared for constant progress. The first few months, and in a manner of speaking, the whole first year, can be considered a period of adjustment. And when this adjustment is once made, there and then begins the process of slow, painstaking, and often painful progress. The priesthood, after all is nothing to be put on hastily. Unlike a suit, which we can buy in the size that fits us best, the priesthood comes in one size, and we must grow, mentally and spiritually, and emotionally, so that we fit it. The sixth class has reached the first big step in this growing process, but this has been accomplished only by climbing six smaller steps. The next six years will be like the past six, a period of adjustment, and then the slow process of growing into a greater state of perfection, and all this, not in a different manner, but rather in the same way on a higher level.

Everyone is called upon to be great in this life. For some, and indeed most people, this consists in doing a multitude of little things well. For a few it

ing a multitude of little things well. For a few it means the performance of one great deed in their lifetime, but the ability to do this one great thing comes from a constant habit of doing little things well.

We can see, then, that the key to greatness is little things. What could be easier? But these little things, because they are insignificant, are apt to seem tedious to us. But they must be done or greatness of any kind will elude us here, and what is more important, hereafter

portant, hereafter.

To get back on the idea of the "bigger and better things," why do we always speak in this manner? Why must we always be moving on, getting better? Even in a business concern, there is no room for standing still. Improvement is the key-word everywhere. This can probably be traced to the innate desire for power. It is a desire to be great. Everyone has this desire, but there are different standards of greatness, and different avenues of approach to it.

According to the pagan, materialistic standards of the modern day, you are accorded a measure of greatness, if you possess to a goodly extent, either beauty, brains, or brawn (or all three) and combined with these, a certain measure of brutality to enable you to climb to the top. If you do not possess much of any of these qualities, you are lumped with the great mass of

human non-entities.

But there is another type of greatness, to which all who are willing can attain. This is the type of greatness exhibited on earth by those people who ar now citizens of the Kingdom of God. Theirs was not a greatness of dazzling superficialities, but a greatness that was sought for until it became a part of their being.

As the sixth class passes out of the picture here at St. Joseph's, we must all make a conscious effort to be great men by the true standards, and not by the pagan standards of quasi-perfection.

We can content ourselves with being merely good, we can be great. It is up to us. A man whose opinion I value very highly once gave me the formula for great-ness. He said: "REMEMBER THAT THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN ness. He said: "REMEMBER THAT THE DIFFE GOOD AND GREAT IS A LITTLE EXTRA EFFORT."




